

You Can't Keep a Good Meme Down: Holy Humor Sunday

For the third year now, Waterford Mennonite Church will observe Holy Humor Sunday, having thus somehow survived the attempts of a pastor and a few wisecrackers to corrupt the solemnity of a Sunday morning.

This year our Holy Humor Sunday at Waterford will be on April 28, following a tradition that many churches mark on the first Sunday after Easter, when God played the greatest joke ever on Satan. This will be a Sunday to celebrate the healing power of laughter amidst our new life in Jesus Christ. We anticipate still encountering our holy God in worship, but, in recognition of God's sense of humor, we also plan to not take ourselves too seriously.

Here's what you can look forward to:

- We start by inviting everyone to come to church wearing a funny hat or some silly clothes. Leave decorum (and your Sunday best) at home. If you already look funny, you'll be better able to receive "funny."
- Back by popular demand will be the Waterford Clean Joke Contest, with our Top 10 Jokes submitted from the congregation itself, and unveiled to us by Alex Berkey and Ava Chupp of our MYF. (See separate article in this issue.)
- Our preacher will be Mark Daniels, local artist and Waterford member.
- Our worship leaders will be Nick and Amanda Stoltzfus, with songleader JD Smucker also keeping us on our toes.
- We will make the closing hymn especially fun again, but not with kazoos this time. Everyone is invited to bring the musical instrument of their choice to play. Never mind if what you bring is of dubious "musical" value.

In addition to the joke contest, younger children can once again expect to contribute (and share) some of their favorite knock-knock jokes in worship.

- As before, our tithes and offerings will be received in unusual receptacles, but not ones as heavy as last year's crockpots. (More than once we planners have backed away from ushers passing bedpans for the offering.)
- Also returning in the bulletin, in case the bad jokes bore you to tears, more church bulletin bloopers, and a new Mennonite Madlib, created by our own JYFer, Eleanor Habecker.

The floods that hit Goshen a little over a year ago led many community leaders to form Elkhart County Emergency Management (ECEM), to improve the provision of resources during a disaster. Now that group is seeking to merge the many organizations that assist during times of need into one unified and coordinated organization, a COAD — Community Organizations Active in Disaster.

ACOAD is an association of humanitarian organizations that participate in all phases of a disaster situation: mitigation, prevention, preparedness, response and recovery. Streamlining service delivery is the goal, as community, faith-based, non-profit, private and public organizations would work to coordinate responses to help disaster survivors. Jennifer Tobey, Director of ECEM, is inviting church representatives to join other organizational representatives in attending a kick-off meeting for this COAD on April 25. It runs 8:30 to 11:00 a.m., starting with a continental breakfast, at United Way of Elkhart County (601 County Road 17, Elkhart).

Are you interested in representing Waterford to learn more about how churches could be part of a coordinated community disaster response? This does not presume your leadership or participation in ongoing COAD efforts, nor does it commit Waterford Mennonite Church to anything. But if you've ever wished our church might be more active in disaster responses, or you feel a personal call to that kind of ministry, this may be just for you. I could not help but think to myself, when was the last time the Bible story brought me such wonder and delight?

Young children are able to worship God in incredible ways. What a joy it is to witness their sacred encounters with God. May our 3 and 4 year olds continue to lead us to Jesus.
