If you don't understand why American Christians seem so hung up on the subject, this session is for you. If you are one who tries to avoid restaurants that serve alcohol, this session is for you. If you brew your own craft beer, this session is for you. If you worry that youth and children today underestimate the devastation that alcoholism causes in individuals and families, please attend this session. If you lament the awkwardness and secrecy you observe in church circles regarding social drinking, please attend this session. Because we so often hang out with people in our own age groups and social circles, we hope to have people here from every Sunday School class at Waterford.

We look forward to your helping us be church together, even when we don't all agree regarding a very practical, tangible matter.

Dr. Nicodemus, D.Th.* meets Jesus, S.O.G.** John 3:1-17

Dr. N.: We know that You are a teacher come from God; for no one can do these signs that You do unless God is with him.

Jesus: Most assuredly I say to you unless one is born again, they cannot see the Kingdom of God.

Commentator: Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews, believed to become a child of God, you had to be born a Jew or go through an intensive ritual to become a Jew.

Dr. N.: How can a man be born again when he is old?

Jesus: Most assuredly I say to you, unless you are born of water and the Spirit you cannot enter the kingdom of God.

Dr. N.: How can these things be?

Jesus: Are you a teacher of Israel and don't know these things? ... If I told you earthly things and you don't believe, how will you believe if I tell you heavenly things? ... Now I'm going to make this simple. Even a child can understand and believe. God so loved the world that He gave His only son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life.

Dr. N.: What about those who have doneterrible things? Can they be saved?

Jesus: God did not send His son into the world to condemn the world. Everyone who believes is not condemned, but one who does not believe in the name of the only Son of God is condemned already because they do not believe in the name of the only Son of God. This is what it means to be born again.

Nicodemus did not have a modern day Theology degree, but as a Jewish leader he was well versed in Jewish Law and Bible knowledge.


