Moving Toward Repair

Acknowledging land and Indigenous Peoples has become a regular part of opening statements during services at Waterford Mennonite Church. This is an opportunity for us to show respect for all of God's Creation and to be reminded of the

many injustices that occurred as white settlers began to occupy this land. Land acknowledgements don't relieve us of the responsibility to seek justice. Acknowledging the land and the peoples who lived here for centuries is an opening act of reorientation in our fractured history. It is important for us as a congregation to discern reparative actions that move toward justice.

Several Nurture Hour classes have studied the issues related to the Doctrine of Discovery and we have had sermons that focused on these injustices. The Seekers class decided to respond to the

learnings by attending the Pokagon Band's pow wow in Dowagiac, Mich., and interacting with leaders in the Language and Culture Department. The class raised money to purchase a portrait of Potawatomi dancers that will be part of a display at WMC.

The portrait of three girls from the Pokagon Band was taken by Sharon Hoogstraten, an artist and visual storyteller who lives in Chicago. She is a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation. The members of this nation are descendants of the Potawatomi who lived in this area and were forced by the U. S. Army to march to Kansas in

1838 on what is known now as the Trail of Death. You can find more of Sharon's photographs on her website -https://

The portrait is of the Rapp sisters - Selpfie (8),

Lilly (6) and Mimika (10) in regalia handed down in their family. They assisted in creating additional parts of their dance regalia. Sharon Hoogstraten took this photograph in 2015. Work will be done over the coming weeks to determine the best way to display the portrait in the church building.

The WMC Endowment fund granted money in 2020 to purchase one of the eight portraits that are on display in the gallery at Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary. These portraits are also part of Sharon's portfolio called *Dancing for My Tribe*. Sharon has expressed gratitude to me for the

support from WMC.

It is important to find additional steps in repair of broken relationships with the Indigenous People in our region and within North America. The Coalition for Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery has just released two new resource for congregations to use as an impetus for reparative actions. Facilities-related Straw Polls

For those of you who were at the May 16 Congregational Meeting via Zoom, here are the results of the facilities-related "straw polls":

Although a straw poll on the fellowship hall was not taken, we heard encouragement in the comments urging the fellowship hall to continue being a priority. At the Ministry Leadership Council meeting on May 18, we noted the encouraging balance in the Welcoming Spaces account along with strong opportunities for additional giving. MLC decided to expedite construction of the pavilion with hope to be able to use it yet this summer. Besides the strong 76 percent positive straw poll, another important factor for moving forward is the increased opportunity for its use this summer and years into the future by congregational celebrations benefiting everyone, especially youth and children. If you would like to offer assistance through an ad hoc "Pavilion Group" for planning things like electricity, a possible platform, a rear wall, deciding on tables/chairs and a storage room inside the shed, please contact Jan Oostland or Aaron Lehman.

The delay in fellowship hall renovations is primarily due to the need to assess the type and location of classroom dividers, which were about two-thirds of the total cost in our earlier estimates. To best determine these, MLC agreed we need time to settle into new routines with our Sunday school classes and large gatherings after not using the space for more than 14 months. As we do this review, we will be seeking ways to gather congregational input into both the fellowship hall and bathroom projects.
