# **Bring the Peace!**

Mennonite Church USA's Biennial Convention theme was "Bring the Peace!", one of the three points of the Journey Forward process. The many meanings of peace – personal peace, interpersonal peace, extending peace to others, and the centrality of Jesus in making peace were the focus of the worship sessions. Looking at peace and reconciliation in situations of oppression, using one's finances to effect social change, working for climate change, teaching children self-understanding, and learning self-understanding in polarized conversations were all addressed in the seminars available to virtual attenders.

Running through all of these presentations was the focus on reconciliation with God, others and ourselves and the importance of Jesus at the center of everything.

Here are two prophetic voices I heard:

Meghan Larissa Good:

"Proclamation of Jesus that skips out on the work of reconciliation loses its purpose; but reconciliation work that gives up on the proclamation of Jesus, loses its very ground."

"True reconciliation involves true healing of mind and body and spirit of every person who's involved in that encounter. [We] don't have that power in [us], but with an active connection with Jesus Christ, we can be channels of a power beyond us . . . we have tried it so little, we don't know there's a difference . . . There is more! There is more available!"

## **MennoCon Cincinnati reflections**

Several of the worship services at MennoCon21 were very good (considering it was all virtual so there wasn't the sensory experience that convention worship usually is). But the highlight for me was the sermon by Jon Carlson, lead pastor of Forest Hills Mennonite Church in Pennsylvania. This sermon, in a worship service themed "Trust the peace," focused on trust, the resurrection of Christ, and love. Separately I have heard messages on these themes before, but I don't think I have ever heard them linked together so powerfully. This was one of the best articulations I recall of an Anabaptist basis for nonviolence. The countercultural nature of the message of Jesus is not merely acknowledged but forthrightly declared. And lest we Mennonites relax, believing that the problem is only with other people "out there" who don't fully "get it," Carlson challenges us on how difficult we too find it to live by trust as fully and radically as God intends.

# Waterford PPP Loan Forgiveness and Allocation of Operating Surplus

Hello Waterford. I hope this communication finds you well. The Ministry Leadership Council (MLC) and Facilities and Finance Ministry Team (FFMT) would like to bring you up to speed on the status of our operating surplus from the prior fiscal year ended 4/30/2021, including the status of federal Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan forgiveness. The application for PPP loan forgiveness was approved in early June. Praise God! Upon forgiveness of the PPP loan, PPP funding was included in the Operating Fund in the prior year's budget to cover payroll, as required by PPP rules.

After including the PPP funding in our Operating Fund, the total surplus for FYE 4/30/2021 is just over \$95,000. The surplus from the prior year represents the amount that the Either Fund giving exceeded the expenses that were incurred. In other words, all designated giving (both designated Operating and MEF fund giving) was used for its designated purpose. The Either Fund giving then covered the difference in each fund and exceeded the remaining expenses for the year which created a surplus. Final totals (approximately) were \$850,000 of revenue (giving + PPP funding), and \$755,000 of expenses, hence a \$95,000 surplus.

FFMT recommended that of the \$95,000 surplus, 72% be allocated to the Operating Fund and 28% allocated to the MEF fund based on their equivalent shares of the 4/30/2021 budget. This represents approximately \$68,000 of the surplus being allocated to the Operating Fund and \$27,000 to the MEF fund. Of the \$68,000 allocated to the Operating Fund, FFMT also recommended that \$24,000 be allocated to undesignated surplus and \$44,000 be allocated to mission & service needs outside of the congregation.

Given the financial resources that God blessed Waterford with in an incredibly challenging year,

FFMT feels like we are called to be generous with our excess. We have tasked the Mission & Service Ministry Team (MSMT) with identifying local and global needs that could be supported with this additional mission & service funding. MLC and FFMT welcome your suggestions for local and global missions & service projects/needs. Please direct those suggestions for consideration to <a href="mailto:Denise Diener">Denise Diener</a> (denisediener@yahoo.com) as chair of MSMT.

In terms of where WMC stands in its overall financial position, after allocating \$24,000 to undesignated surplus, the cumulative undesignated surplus as of 4/30/2021 was \$62,000 which is close to the FFMT recommended level of 10% of our annual budget. In addition to the undesignated surplus, WMC has numerous other designated surplus funds that have been saved from prior years to cover building repairs, family life expenses, among other things. MLC and FFMT rejoice in the strong financial position God has blessed WMC with. We also rejoice in the generosity of WMC members and how that generosity touches many lives both in the WMC community and beyond.

Glen Guyton:
