We have had many people excited and curious with us about what is in store for this summer sabbatical. Your joy has been contagious and we are getting very excited to begin our sabbatical on May 11. As you may remember, I was awarded the Lilly Foundation Sabbatical grant which enables funding for travel for the purpose of rest and renewal. We decided to chose places that have mostly shown an abundance of caution with COVID protocols as that would feel life-giving to us if there were to be another surge while we are away.

Our theme is "Spillin' the Tea: telling a more compassionate story." Our goals for this time are to:

- Practice mindful self-compassion to learn to be a little less self-critical
- Creatively engage with Biblical Storytelling
- Breathe deeply in God's creation to receive God's gentle care for physical and mental well-being

We invite you to join with us on this journey of compassionate storytelling. The Lilly Foundation grant also provides funds for the church to join in with our renewal. Here are some ways to spill the tea with us:

# Outdoor Summer Sunday School for All Ages!



# What Does It Take to Be a Stephen Minister?

Stephen Leaders Liz Gingrich, Lorna and Mel Claassen, and Bill Minter thank the congregation for its prayers, interest and encouragement in the congregation's Stephen Ministry program. In preparation for the information session that will be offered during the May 8th Nurture Hour, the following questions and answers may help you consider your own sense of gifts and call to become a Stephen Minister.

How much of my time will it really involve?

There are 50 hours of training during the September - December 2022 period. As a trained Stephen Minister you will visit about once a week, for about one hour, with the person you are caring for. You will also attend a 2.5 hour monthly meeting with your peer Stephen Ministers for group supervision and continuing education.

How much money will this cost me? Nothing. The congregation has budgeted money for the training materials and other meeting expenses.

Will our pastors still help and counsel people? Most definitely! Stephen Ministers complement the pastors' ministry and provide even more care for people who need it. Along with the class shepherds, this ministry has become an important part of how our congregation cares.

What if I get over my head with people who need more care than I can provide? You will never knowingly be assigned persons who might be in that situation. The Stephen Ministry training also helps you to know exactly when and how to help your care receivers get professional help when necessary. The peer supervision group, the Stephen Leaders and the pastors will also help you make such decisions.

How might I personally benefit from this experience? You will learn many skills that will

be valuable in your personal life as well as in your Stephen Ministry. Also, the satisfaction of helping another person is a wonderful blessing.

Who will be the care receivers? Participants in our congregation who are experiencing times of special need and other acquaintances within our community who may turn to us for help. Thus, Stephen Ministry is also a way to reach out to others who do not have a church community.

Will the care receiver really want my involvement? Yes. Stephen Ministry Referrals Coordinators will meet first with the potential care receiver. Only after the care receiver understands Stephen Ministry and has agreed to meet with a Stephen Minister of the same gender will you be contacted.

Are there other people as unsure as I am about this undertaking? Probably so! But the training will eliminate much of this anxiety because you will not only learn how to respond to people but also, and much more importantly, how to listen.

Are there persons I can talk to who have gone through this training? Yes. Hearing about the experiences of Stephen Ministers in considering this call can be most beneficial. Please feel free to talk to current Stephen Ministers: Helen Bowman, Rachel Brenneman, Marge Gingerich, Anita Myers, Kay Miller or Gary Shetler.

How do I express interest? Attend the "Considering Being a Stephen Minister?" information session listed at the beginning of this article. You can also talk to Liz, Lorna, Mel or Bill. They will have further information for you, and a form available for you to indicate your interest. After completing an Application of Interest, you will then have the opportunity to meet with these Stephen Leaders, ask any questions and make a final decision together.
