# Delegate Reflections on the IMMC Spring Summit

The Spring Summit Delegate Meeting of Indiana Michigan Mennonite Conference was held in person on March 19 and via Zoom on March 26, and delegates could choose which to attend. After worship and the business meeting, the main session was led by Ben Tapper, co-founder of the Kindred Collective, an organization designed to address racial equity through consulting and healing dialogue programs.

Tapper highlighted the elements of white supremacy found in organizations:

- Perfectionism Making a mistake is confused with being a mistake. The belief that there is only one right way to do things.
- Concentration of Power Power is not shared. It is seen as a limited resource which results in secrecy and hoarding information.
- Right to Comfort The belief that those with power have the right to emotional and psychological comfort. Those who cause discomfort in the organization are scapegoated.
- Individualism
- Progress is Bigger/More Progress and success are synonymous with organizational expansion.

An antidote to counter the white supremacy elements within organizations is to become a Learning Organization. The characteristics of a Learning Organization are (1) a structure that supports learning, (2) a climate of trust and safety that cultivates learning, (3) creating opportunities for informal, transformational learning to happen through working and interacting with others, and (4) a capacity to navigate complexity to address challenges and needed change within the organization.

Delegates discussed in small groups what was shared by Tapper. In the large group, we pondered the question, "What is Jesus' call to us?" We were challenged to look at our political and social systems within our congregations. We were invited to follow Jesus in addressing white supremacy without needing to strike out in fear to defend ourselves. And we were reminded that Jesus' miracles were bestowed on the marginalized, thus combating the effects of empire.

Who are we? Where are we? What are the stories we tell about ourselves and our place? These are questions that Waterford has been asking about itself in a few different settings lately.


Ben Tapper added some additional questions that would be important to ask ourselves: What does Jesus ask us to be responsible for? What are the ways that we absolve ourselves of our responsibility for the sake of our individual and collective comfort? How do those expectations and absolutions change depending on our social positions? (A quick reflection for myself: as a heterosexual white male
