## **Spiritual Formation Groups during Advent**

Two of the recurring themes we heard in our Listening Tour were the need for additional opportunities for spiritual formation small groups, and the desire to learn to know others in the broader congregation. In the upcoming months we anticipate offering such types of small groups that center around a specific theme, study, or spiritual practice. For the upcoming season of Advent, I will be leading two such groups using the recently published advent devotional “Expecting Emmanuel: Eight Women Who Prepared the Way.”

The book, written by Joanna Harader with original artwork by Michelle Burkholder, contains short daily devotional readings that will lead us into the stories of the five women in Jesus’ genealogy and three women who later entered his ministry. From the back of the book:

*Christmas is about so much more than twinkle lights, sugar cookies, and perfect family photos. It’s about the world-changing, transforming, and sometimes messy reality of experiencing “God with us.” As we dive deep into the biblical accounts of Jesus’ female ancestors and reflect on God’s presence in their complicated lives – which contain great joy and hope alongside deep pain and trauma – we can begin to release our expectations of a “perfect Christmas” and instead seek the experience of a holy season. Our daughter, Heidi, was diagnosed with Leukemia when she was 15 years old. After three years of treatment, including a short remission, the cancer returned. She was completing her senior year at Bethany Christian School, while preparing for a bone marrow transplant. A final English assignment was to create a visual for a hymn. She chose “Precious Lord, Take My Hand,” WB # 575, VT # 610.

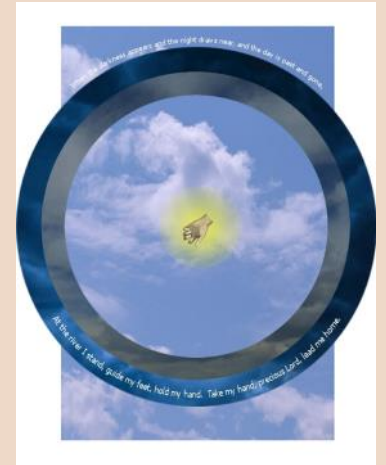
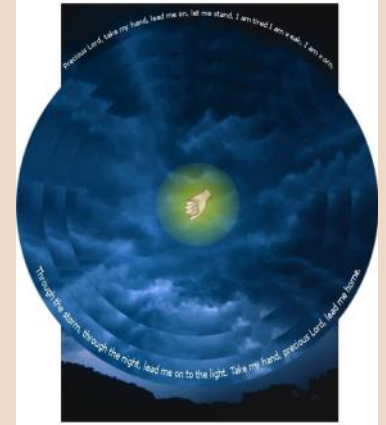
Her visual included four scenes, each with a hand in the center of a circular sky (right). The first sky was dark and the hand clenched tight. Each scene included a progressively lighter sky, while the hand gradually opened. “Lead me on to the light.” She insisted on taking this visual with her to Riley Children’s Hospital, where it was displayed on the wall of her ICU room.

We believe Heidi found comfort in these words, and we believe her Precious Lord did indeed hold her hand as she was taken to her eternal home. It became so meaningful for us that the words are now inscribed on her tombstone in Violet Cemetery.

## Potawatomi Child Inspires Waterford People to Share

On Sunday, Oct. 9, our congregation learned more about God through the cultures of Indigenous Peoples. One of the stories was about a Potawatomi child, who returned his prize money during a powwow, “so that we can all dance again.”

I gave each child, who participated in the children’s time, a dollar, with the challenge that they should find a way to share it. I also invited Waterford adults to join in the fun. Carla and Lorene Miller were two of them who did.

Carla said that the story of the child sharing his prize money inspired her. “I relate to his joy in giving,” she said. “I love to give to

charities.”

Carla asked her sister-in-law, Lorene Miller, to help her make carrot muffins for [The Window](#), a faith-based organization in downtown Goshen, that provides services for people with limited incomes. Carla said that she and Lorene put their dollars together, making \$2, to buy the muffin ingredients that they didn’t already have on hand.

“I had such a wonderful time doing this,” Carla said.

Thank you, Carla and Lorene. I’d love to write more stories about how our congregation shares the gifts that God has given us.
