Stephen Ministers Gather for Annual Retreat

Reconfigured classroom space in the nurture wing of the church building provided the setting for the congregation's Stephen Ministers, Stephen Leaders, and Pastor Deron to gather for a morning retreat on Saturday, January 28. Nina Lanctot, retired pastor and current spiritual director, led the group on the topic of "Wintering: a dark night of the soul." Winter season brings opportunity to hibernate, to turn inwards and to be still and listen. Barbara Brown Taylor's book, "Learning to Walk in the Dark," suggests rather than running from the darkness, we explore the feelings it elicits. Nina pointed out that darkness is a natural rhythm of nature. "Sometimes the light is coming, and sometimes it is going. It will not be dark forever. Even though darkness will inevitably return, so will its end." Participants were given opportunity to review several resources and faith-formation practices related to the theme.

The Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders participated in a ritual of recommitment to service for the year ahead. Note was made of the three new Stephen Ministers who joined earlier in the month. Lorna and Mel Claassen were given grateful recognition for their ten years of service as members of the Stephen Leader Team. The retreat experience ended by having a lunch together.

- •the need for connection

- •using triggers to gain consciousness, healing, and freedom•the transforming power of grace
- 3) Engaging in specific practices related to the presentations

4) Group sharing about what is noticed in oneself about the experience.

5) Specific challenges to help enhance the benefit of the experience between meeting times.
