New Purchased Books

An Untidy Faith: Journeying Back to the Joy of Following Jesus, by Kate Boyd. In the wake of scandal, culture wars, and abuse, many Christians are wondering if the North American church is redeemable, and if not, whether they should even stay. Many are answering no, but this book is for those who want to disentangle their faith from all of the cultural baggage and recapture the joy of following Jesus.

Godbreathed: What It Really Means for the Bible to Be Divinely Inspired, by Zack Hunt. What if the imperfections, and contradictions in Scripture were allowed to be there by the Holy Spirit in order to draw us beyond the literal words on the page, and deeper into the Spiritual truth God is trying to teach? It is, in fact, an ancient way of understanding what it means for the Bible to be divinely inspired. Hunt offers a practical approach for reading & understanding the Bible that doesn't require a PhD in biblical languages.

Stuck Together: The Hope of Christian Witness in a Polarized World, by Nelson J. Kraybill. It seems as though the world and church are more polarized than ever before. Kraybill suggests we can take hope from the early Christian vision of God uniting all things in Christ, a hope that can lead us to act. Bible stories and narratives, ancient and modern, can inspire us to open our hearts and minds to persons with whom we disagree as we gain confidence in our own convictions. Kraybill draws from Scripture, his own life journey, and the witness of others.

Janet Shoemaker, Editor buzz@waterfordchurch.org And We Walk: confessions of faith, hope and love, by J.E. Misz. This book features poems J.E. has written over the course of the last decade. J.E. weaves in both humor and reverence to address topics such as addictions, mental and physical health, justice, peace and love of God and others.

Finding Our Way Forward: When the Children We Love Become Adults, by Melanie Springer Mock. The author draws on her decades as a college professor and mother of four adult children to challenge, equip, and encourage the parents of emerging young adults. Young people are told they need to discern God's calling for their lives. The author explores how finding our way means developing a more expansive understanding of calling for ourselves and the young adults we love. One that moves beyond vocation and capitalistic enterprises to what God really calls us to: seeking justice, loving mercy, loving others and God.

East of Liberal: Notes on the Land, by Raylene Hinz-Penner. The author offers an engaging personal and political narrative that explores the contradictions, myths, and resilience of what we call her landlines. Her memoir includes helpful distillations of significant historical periods and patterns of Mennonite migrations and indigenous and settler histories.

The White Mosque: A Memoir, by Sofia Samatar. In the nineteenth century, a group of German-speaking Mennonites traveled from Russia into Central Asia. Over a century later, Sofia Samatar joins a tour following their path, fascinated not by the hardships of the journey, but by its aftermath. The establishment of a small Christian village in the Muslim Khante of Khiva, named "The White Mosque" after the Mennonites white washed church, the village lasted for fifty years.

Living that Matters: Honest Conversations for Men of Faith, by Steve Thomas and Don Neufeld. A practical guide to help individuals and groups engage in conversations on what matters most for men, with a focus on following Jesus, forming community, and building peace.

Luke: Believers Church Bible Commentary, by Mary Schertz. The book of Luke offers a matchless portrait of Jesus Christ, and those who followed him. Luke demonstrates both the cost of the Kingdom and the exuberance of a life lived in loyalty to Jesus, and the strength of the Spirit.
