

# Local Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery Events

The WMC DDoD group invites you to join with us and AMBS professor Janeen Bertsche Johnson on Saturday, October 28, for an excursion to where the 1838 Trail of Death started at Twin Lakes, Ind. Janeen will provide historical input at the site of the church where the Potawatomi were forced to gather. The tour includes going to the Chief Menomonie marker and the first stop on the Trail of Death as the Potawatomi were marched to Kansas by the US Army. Janeen will also lead the group in reflections on this injustice to guide lament and response.

The first markers acknowledging the existence of a commercial route established by Indigenous Peoples to connect present-day Fort Wayne, Indiana, to Chicago, Illinois, were unveiled on the campus of Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary, Sept. 29.
