From MCC US National Peace & Justice Ministries: Asylum seekers are individuals who have left their homes in other countries and are seeking protection from persecution or serious human rights violations. Those granted asylum in the U.S. are provided with work authorization, some federal benefits, and a path to permanent residence leading to citizenship. Yet the asylum process is plagued by a backlog, and takes an average of four years to complete.

Currently, asylum seekers must wait 180 days after they file an application to receive work authorization, preventing them from supporting their families or providing for their basic needs. The Asylum Seeker Work Authorization Act (S. 255, H.R. 1325) would shorten the waiting period for work authorization to 30 days. The Senate version shortens the wait period for those who enter through official ports of entry while the House version shortens the wait period for all (no matter their entry point) and eliminates the need to renew the authorization every two years.

Please encourage your representative to pass H.R. 1325 and your senators to amend S. 255 to align with the House version.
