Advent and Christmas at Waterford

Advent 2023: "How will we know?"

December 3 marks the beginning of the season of Advent. During this liturgical season of the church, we will join believers around the world in a time of watching, waiting, preparing, and expecting. This year we will utilize the worship resource in "The Leader," a periodical produced by MennoMedia.

The theme this year is, "How will we know?" The resource planners worked to hold scripture in one hand and the 'newspaper' in the other hand. As they sat with scripture and all that is happening in our world, they were left with many questions. This Advent they invite us to lean into our questions. To wonder and wander and wait together for the Messiah, the Christ child, the light.

The material expounds on this theme by sharing that the overarching question "How will we know?" invites us to "Lean into the ways that our faith invites us to sit together, to discern the times, to watch and wait, and to trust that we will know when we know, and that even when we have questions and even doubts, God is still with us; still then, God is working." Each week we will delve further into this overarching question as together we lean into the questions and the waiting.

A word of gratitude to the Method family who will prepare our worship visual arts for Advent. Our journey of Advent moves us from darkness to light. In addition to lighting the peace lamp and advent candles, each

Immigration Advocacy and Resources

There are more big changes at **La Posada Immigrant Aid**. Read the whole story at this link, and learn how you can support their work.

From MCC US National Peace & Justice Ministries: Asylum seekers are individuals who have left their homes in other countries and are seeking protection from persecution or serious human rights violations. Those granted asylum in the U.S. are provided with work authorization, some federal benefits, and a path to permanent residence leading to citizenship. Yet the asylum process is plagued by a backlog, and takes an average of four years to complete.

The Asylum Seeker Work Authorization Act (S. 255, H.R. 1325) would shorten the waiting period for work authorization from 180 to 30 days. The Senate version shortens the wait period for those who enter through official ports of entry while the House version shortens the wait period for all (no matter their entry point) and eliminates the need to renew the authorization every two years.

Please encourage your representative to pass H.R. 1325 and your senators to amend S.255 to align with the House version.
