# Downtown Ministries Moves In

Pastor Deron, for Mission & Service Ministry Team

Our church house is now being used by Goshen's own Downtown Ministries. They describe themselves this way: "Downtown Ministries is all about 'Loving Our Neighbor and Serving Our City.' Downtown Ministries exists to impact and change communities by offering sustainable solutions that provide hope, purpose, and partnership to resource and restore our community's most vulnerable populations." With the addition of the Waterford house, the ministry now has four transitional houses in Goshen. These spaces provide transitional housing to help individuals and families transition out of environments of domestic, physical, and sexual abuse. While Downtown Ministries will be fully responsible for supervision of their tenants and care for the house, stay tuned for opportunities to be involved as good neighbors and supportive partners.

# **Advent Reflection**

# **Christmas Praise Edifies the Family**

Praising God is at the very center of Advent season. This is a reality because during the Christmas celebration, heaven and earth come together. It is also the time in history when we see the human and the divine natures portrayed in the birth of Jesus. And it is a wonderful feeling to know that His name is called Immanuel which means "God with us" (Matt. 1:23). This is a great reason to praise God in Christ because God, through the spirit, is in our midst.

During the advent season the ministry of the angels is quite evident. According to the gospels, the angels appeared to most of the persons that God chose to make the advent of Jesus Christ possible. Here I present the diversity of appearances: to Joseph (Matthew 1:20); to Zacharias (Luke 1:11); to Mary (Luke 1:30); and to the shepherds (Luke 2:9). And we know that on each occasion the angels instilled confidence to them by saying: "Don't be afraid."

All of these people had the heavenly affirmation. God dealt with their fears, doubts and their overall human frailties. Even though Jesus' birth continued to be a mysterious event for them, they eventually submitted to the will of God. So, let us give praise and glory to God for using all these people to make possible the greatest event in history: "The coming of the Messiah."

Today, Christmas is a family celebration because Jesus became part of a human family. It is also very evident throughout the gospels that, in Christ, God creates a spiritual family. Praising the Lord for all of His good deeds during the Christmas season will strengthen the family and keep it together.

So, let us make ours the praise that the host of angels pronounced to the shepherds: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace among those whom he favors: (Luke 2:14). *See the Spanish version of this reflection on page 3.*

# La alabanza en el tiempo de Navidad edifica a la familia

La alabanza a Dios es una parte céntrica de la época navideña. Esto es una realidad ya que en la celebración de la Navidad el cielo y la tierra se unen. Es también el momento histórico en que tanto la naturaleza humana como divina tiene su manifestación en el nacimiento del niño Jesús. Y además, es una maravillosa experiencia el que se ha llamado Emanuel, que significa "Dios con nosotros" (Mateo 1:23).
