### **Gary Shetler Completes His Stephen Ministry Service** *By the Stephen Leader Team*



After serving our congregation as a Stephen Minister for twelve years, Gary Shetler recently chose to complete his ministry. Gary was trained in the second cohort of Stephen Ministers in 2011. During his tenure he accompanied nine congregational members during a portion of their life journey through loss.

Asked what influenced him to become a

Stephen Minister, Gary stated, "Two events influenced me. In 2004, the seeds were planted when I participated in the Uniquely You [Combining 23 Spiritual Gifts and 4 (DISC) Personality Types] workshops facilitated by Cynthia Kauffmann, Bill Minter and Ron Weirich. Then in 2011, after I inquired about Stephen Ministry, Bill Minter kindly met with me to answer my further questions."

Reflecting on how serving as a Stephen Minister impacted his spiritual journey, Gary shared, "I like what John Mattis wrote in Salt & Light (Fall 2023, page 75). 'Incarnation implies a practical wisdom that dares the love, intimacy, and friendship as we accompany one another...come what may...' Accompanying others did influence my spiritual life."

Gary continued, "All my caring relationships in Stephen Ministry have been rewarding. Small miracles do happen! When it seemed that there was no way clear to go forward, God was there with us and provided for us. The words 'be still' and 'wait on the Lord' have a much deeper meaning for me now." *Continued on next page*

A 'safe house' is built when there is grace-based acceptance, listening, trust, empathy, and confidentiality."

For those in the congregation who have been reluctant to consider becoming a Stephen Minister Gary advised, "If the idea comes to anyone about the possibility of serving in Stephen Ministry, I encourage you to consider it (and talk to a Stephen Leader). What I learned and experienced as a Stephen Minister has been a blessing beyond measure!

### Meet the Hershbergers—John, Diana and Jeff



John was born in Iowa, the oldest of five children, and lived with his family on farms near Kalona and Wellman. At age 10 the family moved to a farm near Middlebury, Indiana. This was a major, disruptive move away from extended family and a protective small school. After graduating from Middlebury High School in 1968 he entered

Goshen College. He completed a degree in history. He met Diana Nafziger in college and they married in 1972. But an inability to coach or drive a school bus required a change in career path. So, he worked for two years as Director of Alumni Relations at the college. Then a scholarship offer led to a seminary year at AMBS. In 1975 they moved to Iowa City where John worked for four years on the pastoral team at First Mennonite Church and began graduate studies. In 1981 he completed a PhD in Religion and Personality at the University of Iowa. They returned to Goshen where John worked at Oaklawn for over 27 years as a licensed mental health clinician. After nine additional years combined at Elkhart General Hospital and Maple City Health Care, he retired in 2017.

Diana was born in Goshen, the second of four children born to Marvin and Edith Nafziger. She attended schools in Goshen and graduated from Bethany Christian High School in 1967. She then attended Goshen College, graduating in 1971 with a degree in education. After marriage she worked several years at Menno Travel Service. In Iowa City she again was employed as a travel agent and then at a university program. Katie and Jeff were born in this era. After moving back to Goshen in 1981, she stayed home to care for the two young children. Her main focus over the next years morphed into learning about autism and helping navigate Jeff through years of special education. She and John helped form the Elkhart Area Autism Chapter and she did a lot of public speaking about autism in the schools Jeff attended as well as the wider community. She participated in the development of a state-wide autism advocacy organization during this time. She also worked at several part-time jobs including as a mental health worker at Oaklawn and in the Goshen College Health Center. After Jeff finished high school, she worked a number of years at Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference and in the College Mennonite Church office before retiring in 2017.



After a lengthy and tumultuous process Jeff was diagnosed with autism in 1989. These were the early days when knowledge was limited and services meager. With special education assistance and accommodations Jeff proudly graduated from Goshen High School in 2000. He continues to live at home with his parents, who are his guardians. He has received a variety of services from agencies over the years. But the course has been intermittent and unpredictable.

However, his part-time job at Maple City Health Care Clinic has been a highly valued opportunity for 22 years now. He enjoys watching sports, attending movies, playing video and board games, listening to music of all genres, and a wide range of cuisine in sizeable amounts. Fortunately he exercises faithfully and vigorously. His sister Katie, her husband, and two young children live nearby in Elkhart.

John, Diana, and Jeff have been long-time members of College Mennonite Church. They are grateful for the warm and gracious welcome received from Waterford Mennonite.
