Lent – Christ Among Us Cindy Voth, for Worship Ministry Team

Lent is a season for prayerful reflection as we prepare to faithfully follow Jesus through the events of Holy Week. We will begin our Lenten journey with an Ash Wednesday service on February 14 at 7 p.m. where we remember who we are and who God is. Pastors will offer to place ashes on foreheads or hands as a sign not only of our mortality but also of forgiveness and new life.

Sunday mornings during Lent will focus on the theme "Christ Among Us." We will draw from resources created by members of the New York Mennonite Conference in *Leader* magazine, a worship resource published by MennoMedia. Weekly scriptures focus on covenants within the story of God's people. They remind us that covenants begin with God, and that God continues to reach out to humans and creation.

Our worship each week will also include a prayer of confession. Authors of the resource offer, "Lent begins and continues with a repentant heart. Following Jesus through the wilderness means that we acknowledge the ways we are tempted again and again . . . throughout the season of Lent, we practice a communal confession, bearing this burden together and reminding one another of the healing that comes from God's mercy and grace, shown to us by Jesus and the Holy Spirit."

Holy week begins with a Maundy Wednesday service on Wednesday, March 27, at 6:00 p.m. The evening will include a fellowship meal, worship, and a time of footwashing. On Easter day, we will begin with a 7:00 a.m. sunrise service, followed by a 9:00 a.m. brunch in our fellowship hall, and concluding with a 10:00 a.m. worship service where we celebrate the resurrection and share in communion.

Meet New Attender Elizabeth Stauffer

Two major life events this past year brought me to Waterford: Bonneyville Mennonite Church, where we attended and were actively involved for over 50 years, closed; and my husband, Don, after years of progressive dementia, moved to Greencroft Healthcare. Without the one I would not have needed to look for a new church; without the other, I could not have done so.

I grew up on the Canadian prairies (Saskatchewan), attended Bethel College in North Newton Kan., and came to the Michiana area when I married Don in 1968. He grew up in Nebraska, came to Elkhart to do alternative service at Mennonite Board of Missions, now Mennonite Mission Network, and stayed to work for a local accounting firm. We met at the wedding of mutual friends.

Until we moved to Goshen in 2016, we lived on 95 acres of woods and marsh near Union, Mich., where Don enjoyed creating and maintaining an extensive trail system and I delighted in foraging for all manner of free food. There we raised our three children. Our youngest son, Paul, and his wife, Jennifer Shell, now own that property, so I still have access to it when I need a refreshing nature fix.

But Goshen was hardly new to us when we moved. Both Don and I had worked in Goshen, he as founding partner of Stauffer & Company, a local accounting firm, and I for Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference. Our children are all Bethany graduates, and Paul is a Goshen College graduate.

After 20 years in Boston, Paul and Jen moved back to Goshen. He continues to work remotely for the Computer Science Department at Boston University. Our oldest son, Chris, attended Bethel College (Kan.) where he met and married Miriam Huebert, and stayed in Kansas. He is a partner in an accounting firm in North Newton, and he and Miriam are the parents of our four grandchildren. Our daughter, Lisa, studied piano at EMU and Catholic University and married Isaac Wengerd. She died of non-Hodgkins lymphoma at age 29.

A highlight of our empty-nest years was travelling regularly, between 1995 and 2007, to Afghanistan where Don worked with the annual financial audit for International Assistance Mission and I helped in the small school for ex-patriot children, taught English and helped in the IAM office. In 2007 we spent five months in Kabul while Don served as interim finance director for IAM, while I again helped in the school and dealt with the challenges of third world housekeeping. It was an unforgettable adventure!

A retirement interest for me is learning more about my ancestral story and passing it on to my children and grandchildren. That passion has taken us to Ukraine and Uzbekistan, and less exotic places like Nebraska and Oklahoma. I am also (slowly) doing some writing about my own life. I am a knitter and enjoy reading and watching PBS documentaries, and volunteer weekly at the MCC Material Resource Center.
