Meet Ruby Bontrager



I grew up in Elkhart County. My father had a flourishing feed mill business. His Number One love was reading and traveling, which he did rather extensively over the years. My parents often hosted family and friends, including owners of the grocery store and a few of the customers. There was always lots of noise, people of all kinds around, salesmen who treated us children like we were their nephews and nieces. Going to a friend's house who were farmers always seemed like a very

lonely life to me. My mother didn't enjoy travel much, so dad took us children with him. When it was my turn, I went to the Middle East with him and then also traveled through Europe, mostly by train, and returned on Queen Mary, docking at New York City. It was short of two months of travel. I am a graduate of Bethany Christian High School, took classes at IU South Bend, and several at AMBS. That helped me with my interest in biblical understanding, history, the meaning of life and how we are meant to live. Questions don't always have answersonly more questions.

I was married to Ellis Bontrager for 62 years. He died September 5, 2021, after being diagnosed with Prostate Cancer four years earlier. He graduated from Goshen College and from the University of New Mexico with a Masters degree in Education. We lived in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he began his teaching career as an elementary public school teacher teaching 4th – 6th grades and kindergarten one year. In 1974 we moved to Bristol, Ind., where Ellis taught in the Edwardsburg

Delegate Reporting

IMMC Spring Summit Meeting

I have the privilege of reporting on the good work of the Indiana Michigan Mennonite Conference [IMMC]. As delegates, we met for the in-person meeting of the Spring Summit on March 9 at Prairie Street Mennonite Church in Elkhart. There will be an additional Zoom meeting on March 16 for delegates who could not attend the in-person meeting.

The main topic of the delegate meeting was a proposed draft revision of the by-laws to provide for the inclusion of youth into the voice and voting of our conference. Broadly speaking, this would allow congregations to discern up to two persons who could be added to the congregation's delegates that may meet the definition of 'youth'.

This is not a new idea. A young seminarian named Stephen Lowe took us on a tour of "the rabbit trails" of his thinking. Stephen started with the movie Shark Boy and Lava Girl, where a boy named Max had to reimagine his dream world in order to save it and avoid the fears that lead to nightmares. With this analogy, Stephen led us on to the prophet Jeremiah. Because of his young age, Jeremiah believed he couldn't serve [ref. Jeremiah 1:4-9]. God called Jeremiah anyway. Stephen turned our attention to the Christian church in crisis. "Youth are not leaving the church; the church is leaving youth behind!" Stephen concluded with the prophet Joel [ref. Joel 2:28] and these three challenges:

- 1. The church has a responsibility to be a truth-teller.
- 2. We should involve the youth as the church of NOW, not the church of tomorrow.
- 3. Dream a better dream!

The morning group discussion highlighted the voice of youth within our congregations as bringing energy to our gatherings and adding prophetic vision. Our Waterford Mennonite Church (WMC) congregation is no different. In the lead-up to the actual vote on this change, IMMC is requesting congregational input and feedback on the proposed by-law changes in the coming weeks.

In Prairie Street Mennonite Church's tradition, we sang ourselves from the sanctuary service to the delegate session in the fellowship hall. The hosting provided by this congregation highlights their mission and role within their community. We did spend some time in review of the 2024-25 IMMC budget, which was relatively straight forward. We found it helpful to frame the work of the IMMC within the following spending categories: Empowering Pastors (41%), Engaging Congregations (42%), and Equipping Leaders (17%).

We are inspired by Rudolf Steiner's (Waldorf) educational philosophy which values the use of story and play to teach along with the use of natural materials for toys and handwork projects whenever possible. In addition, we value time spent in nature and spend time outside in all weather and seasons.



Editor's note: Rock Run Co-op is in its second year of meeting on our property. We are pleased to be able to share our nurture wing, playground, and wetlands with them.

This year our group has about 29 children from 13 families ranging in age from

toddlers through high school students. Our Friday mornings are spent participating in more structured activities within four age-based groups. Then following lunch and recess we often have a combination of handwork and free play. Some examples of afternoon activities include drama, nature study, painting or drawing, group games and crafts like knitting.


Mennonite Action's binational Holy Week of Action

Around the building

Sanctuary Technology Upgrades

I'm thrilled to share some exciting lighting and video upgrades coming this summer! Last summer, we experienced some technical failures in the 23-year-old system that controls the Sanctuary lights. Bob Hochstedler and I were able to rewire the system to get it into a working state to hold it over until we can replace the system, making this project a major priority. The new lighting system will have brand-new LED platform lighting and all-new system controls making maintenance easier and a lot safer. Better positioning of the platform lights and better control of the house lights are just some of the improvements planned for this project.

Another project happening this summer will be to upgrade our aging video projector. Our current projector was purchased in November of 2010, and it has been increasingly difficult to find parts for it. There is currently a promotional deal that saves us \$2,000 for the projector, making it an ideal time for us to complete this project now. We are planning on completing these projects during the first two weeks of June while we are doing outdoor worship. All the installation will be done using in-house volunteers thus saving us significantly on the cost of these projects. The lighting project is budgeted to cost \$28,330 and the projector is budgeted to cost \$4,876.25.

Note from Pastor Cindy Voth, for Ministry Leadership Council

Since the total cost of the project is over \$20,000, the Facilities and Finance Ministry Team, per our policy, submitted a proposal to Ministry Leadership Council for their review and approval. MLC approved the proposal during our February meeting. We are so grateful for Colin and his leadership and collaboration with Bob and the FFMT. We are also grateful that we have the financial reserves set aside for our building upkeep to cover the cost of this project. Please contact Colin or Bob if you have any questions about the upgrades, and a member of MLC if you have any questions about the process.
