Pathfinders: Still finding paths

The Pathfinders are beloved children of God.

That's one of the few declarative statements that can be made about everyone in the Sunday school class that typically meets behind the first door in the fellowship hall's new hallway.

Oh, and that we're pathfinders. But more on that later.

Birth years in the class range from early 1950s to the early 1970s. We check a lot of boxes on the couple status question of a survey – married, never married, formerly married through death or separation. For those with children, our kids range from teenagers to those with teenagers of their own. Some of us began attending Waterford soon after the church began, while others have begun attending quite recently.

We've spent our time in many ways. Many have served overseas or domestically as volunteers. Some have had significant times of no paid employment, while some have worked part-time, some full-time and at times, more than full-time. Many of us have spent time in more than one of those groups. Educationally, we tend toward being college grads, though some are not and some have advanced degrees.

On a given Sunday, there are about 20 or so people in the room, with a few joining by Zoom, but there are about 40 individuals on the class email. Our attendance isn't that poor; we just have folks that remain connected to the group. On most Sundays Pathfinders are also elsewhere in the building, notably teaching children and youth.

We've had people in visible leadership positions, with others serving behind the scenes. We're committed to the local and broader church and its ministries.

And committed to each other. We're good at both laughing together and crying together. A reason for our breadth of experience is that we have been known as warm, welcoming and inviting to anyone, supporting each other along life's journey. We've even published our own cookbook, written to collect and share recipes for the food we brought to each other following childbirths, funerals and medical procedures. Some of those cookbooks are still in service, showing the food stains of continued use. In fact, there's Chili Chicken Lasagna in this author's freezer right now.

From these paragraphs, you can see why "categorizing" the class can be difficult. On most measurable markers, the bell curve of our distribution will be a little shorter at the peak and a little broader at the base. (Another point of variance – some of us like numbers and stats; others not so much. But you could say the same about sports, reading novels, cooking and baking and any number of other things some of us do for enjoyment.)

Our class began in the early 1980s, and the name "Pathfinders" was eventually chosen to recognize the transition point many were in and as a way of committing to finding life's path together. Which leads us back to that word. As individuals in community, we've found a lot of paths, but we're still finding more.

The paths have changed, however. Once we were considering how to relate to our middle-age parents; now we're in the middle, with many of us considering how to relate to (and care for) aging parents. Once we were the younger adults just starting out; now many of us our supporting our own children as younger adults just starting out. Once we were trying to figure out how to start a working career, now many of us are trying to figure how to end one.

But the common theme in the pathfinding has been (and still is) doing the search together, committed to discipleship and faithfulness. We learn from each other. We each bring gifts to the table. And together we walk, in thankfulness and joy. If that sounds like a journey you want to be on, please join us.

Online Registration is Open for 2024 Fall Spanish Language Program: Goshen College will offer evening beginner to advanced conversational Spanish classes for adults in the fall semester.
