

#### **Invitation to Share Your Musical Gifts**

At Waterford we are blessed with a wide range of individuals who freely and joyfully share their gifts within our worship services from worship leaders, to drama participants, to AV folks, to leaders of children's time, and beyond! Worship Ministry Team (WMT) works closely with the pastoral team to plan out the broad themes of our worship services as well as some of the specific details for our weekly times of communal worship. One of those specific details is related to our music, both congregational singing and musical offerings for prelude and offertory.

Prior to the pandemic, it was common to have a pianist who accompanied the singing, and a different person who would offer the music for prelude and offertory. As with a variety of things, this pattern was modified during the pandemic. We are aware that serving as the piano accompanist to our singing is one thing, and offering special music as our prelude and offertory is something entirely different. At WMT we have named our desire to incorporate more people in our music ministry and wish to create space for those who feel comfortable with providing special music but not with accompanying.

So, WMT is calling everyone with musical gifts to consider sharing them within our communal worship services as acts of service and worship. Do you play the trombone or violin or piano or another instrument? Have you just recently started playing or have you been playing for decades? #### A Note of Thanks

A spiritual practice I have enjoyed and found helpful has been to greet each new day with two thoughts. The first is more of a prayer. "God, I don't know what you have planned for this day, but if there is any way I can join with you in what you are doing, any way I can be a blessing to others, help me to be sensitive and aware of the opportunities." The second practice is seeking to always, "Treasure the moment with gratitude, for we don't know what tomorrow may bring."

This became very real Saturday evening, September 28. A strange new heart rhythm put me in the Goshen Hospital emergency room, Ventricular Tachycardia, a life threatening heart condition. This wasn't on my agenda for the day.

The journey that followed included two more 'code blue' interventions in the Goshen Hospital, attempted air lift transport to IU Health in Indianapolis prevented by weather resulting in transport by ambulance, an emergency surgery for a temporary external pace maker with the hope of getting me to Indianapolis alive Monday night, arriving early Tuesday morning.

Intensive Care Unit until October 8, not allowed to get out of bed, three more 'code blue' interventions in Indianapolis, two more surgical procedures, one six and one half hours without general anesthesia, fully awake and trying to hold still. The song "Be Still and Know That I Am God" kept running through my mind. And I am wondering what God has in mind. What is His plan? Is this the end of life here? If not, how do I join with Him in His work in my little part of the world? I am confined to a not so comfortable bed with wires and tubes covering me like a bowl of spaghetti, and a symphony of alarms sounding almost all the time. My body is in distress, but I feel God's presence. How do I bring His peace and love to those who are attending to me? What is God doing, or seeking to do in the lives of the doctors and nurses attending to me and trying to keep me alive? Or is this the end of my time on this earth? Is God just focusing on giving Lila and I peace? Lila and I both felt the end had come more than once. Paul's words "to die is gain" went through my mind. And I felt peace. Lila also felt that peace. God was very present, even in the really difficult and painful times. A testimony of God's presence was the question from a doctor the day after one of the really difficult 'code blue' interventions. He said, "You were the calmest person in the room. Why? How could you be so calm?"

Lila and I both knew our Waterford church family, the Seekers class, friends, and family were praying for us. We felt it and lived it. Thank you for being our caring community. Our children were tremendous in making sure at least one of them were with us, which meant time off work, air flights, and schedule changes for them. A soup meal when we arrived home on October 9, flowers, many cards, a mug of chocolate, nuts and balloon, visits, all have been tangible ways we have been cared for. Thank you. And may you know God's peace and presence with you as you seek to be a part of what God is doing wherever you are.
