Meet Bob and Sue Troyer



Bob was born in Geneva, Nebraska, and lived in Shickley until he was seven years old. His family moved to Spartansburg, Pennsylvania, in 1956 to a dairy farm. He attended Valley View Mennonite Church in Spartansburg. His family enjoyed singing together and would occasionally sing at area churches. In 1967 he graduated from

high school and was drafted, so he elected to join 1-W service and was sent to Elkhart General Hospital in Elkhart, Indiana.

In 1967, after Sue graduated from Middlebury High School in Middlebury, Ind., she enrolled in the School of Radiologic Technology at Elkhart General Hospital. Bob and Sue met in Elkhart and the rest is history—it was love at first sight. They were married in 1970.
