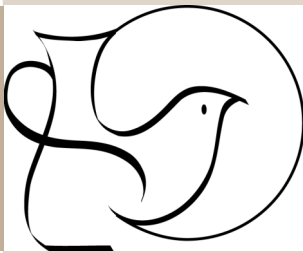

Youth Learning Tour to Benin

In 2003 Waterford Mennonite Church entered a partnership with Benin Bible Institute (BBI) in Cotonou, Benin. Over the past 23 years, this partnership has flourished and created opportunities for cross-cultural learning and bridgebuilding between Goshen, Indiana, and West Africa. A highlight of our partnership is the sending and receiving of delegates. Our typical pattern (except for the COVID years) is that WMC sends delegates to BBI one year and receives delegates from BBI the following year.

We renewed our partnership during a delegation visit to Benin in November 2023. In the fall of 2024, we welcomed the BBI Board President Germain Dossou and BBI Board Member Jocelyne Ahoga.

Several years ago, we started to dream with our friends at BBI about the possibility of bringing a youth delegation from Waterford. What would it be like to provide the opportunity for Waterford youth to travel to Benin and interact with Beninese youth? What might our Waterford youth learn about the global church and our amazing God through such learning opportunities? And so the dreaming continued until we discerned with BBI that the timing was right for such a trip to occur.

I am delighted and excited to share with you that there is a group of 13 youth and 7 adults from Waterford who are planning to participate in a Youth Learning Tour to Benin in July 2026. I will lead the trip, along with Rod & Lynda Hollinger-Janzen, who will serve as our interpreters and translators of the language, culture, relationships, history, and more! We will be joined by other adult leaders: Matt & Becky Bateman, Melissa Gillette, and Shawn Stutzman. See **Benin** on page 3

On January 11 we will return to our Holistic Health Worship Series. Prior to Advent, we devoted two Sundays to focusing on our spiritual health and one Sunday focusing on our healthy boundaries and sexuality. As we pick up the series again, we will spend time considering how we are invited as followers of Jesus to seek health and wholeness with our physical, emotional and mental, and relational health.

Layna and Lacy Stoltzfus will continue to offer the gift each week of a liturgical dance. Loanne Harms will continue to work on our visual arts collage of items we have contributed. As a reminder, here are items to bring for the upcoming Sundays. There will be a basket located at the entrances to the sanctuary where you can place your items.

- Jan. 11: Physical health—something medical, an adhesive bandage, a splint, gauze, medicine bottle, etc.
- Jan. 18 & 25: Emotional/mental health—incense, CD, mantra, yoga pose, stress ball, anything that helps you relax or focus
- Feb. 1: Relational health—photo of friends, family, social media post, address book page, thank you card, etc.
- Feb. 8: Relational health—(although we are not including financial in this series, we did focus on this last year and want to include it in our collage, so) check book page, check, balance sheet, small coins, etc.
- Feb. 15: Holistic Health—weaving it together and final collage (hopefully)

We are grateful for the wealth of knowledge, wisdom, and experience within our faith community. We look forward to hearing from a variety of voices during this series as guest preachers, members of panels, and weekly testimonies.

The youth going are: Gretchen Bateman, Cori Chupp, Gideon Miller, Dominic Ramer, Ethan Claassen, Lacy Stoltzfus, Lucas Bateman, Miles Gillette, Noah Sanchez, Liam Wyse-Fisher, Hannah Claassen, Susanna Stutzman, and Thomas Voth.

The 13 youth are committed to paying \$500 toward the anticipated cost of \$2,100 per person (\$1,600 airfare, \$500 in-country expenses). I have encouraged them to find ways to save or work for the money (I even provided statistics of how many avoided trips to Starbucks it would take to save \$500!). These youth are also committed to monthly meetings where we are learning about the culture and customs of Benin, along with Beninese religious beliefs and worldviews. At our last meeting we enjoyed African groundnut stew made by the Hollinger-Janzen as we looked at various biblical texts and considered how we interpret them and how our Beninese siblings interpret them.

While in Benin, we look forward to meeting multiple times with the same group of Beninese high school youth from a local congregation. During those times we will be sharing and learning about how each of us experience God, worship, faith, and discipleship in our various contexts.

Our Beninese friends are hard at work to organize our lodging, food and various activities, and will make final determinations about how the visit will be arranged. We anticipate that it may involve some of the following cultural and historical learning experiences of previous WMC Delegates such as visiting the Slave Port, a local school, touring BBI's School and Farm, the Palace in Abomey, visiting La Casa Grande children's home, eating traditional Beninese food, and more.

We invite your prayers for our group as we continue to prepare for the trip. We believe that the preparations prior to going are extremely important for our engagement while we are in Benin. We seek to have a posture of curiosity and learning while being open to fully engage in our learnings and building of relationships.

We warmly invite you to our main fundraiser (and perhaps only fundraiser!!) on February 1. Instead of our normal monthly potluck, our group will provide the lunch of African groundnut stew, rice, various toppings, and dessert. (If you haven't had groundnut stew before, it's like haystacks with the stew being peanut based and, of course, delicious!). During the lunch we will share things we have been learning about and things we are looking forward to.

Thanks to the youths' contributions to the trip, WMC budget for our BBI Partnership exchanges, and donations already received, we are needing to only raise an additional \$9,000. We invite you to come with hungry bellies and generous spirits to our fundraiser on February 1. Donations can be made at anytime with checks being made out to Waterford with "BBI Trip" in the memo line.
